Public viewing – 2:00pm – 4:00pm

Rules:

- 1) Entries open to all amateurs.
- 2) Doors open to public following judging (approx. 2:00pm).
- 3) Ribbons awarded to first, second, and third place winners.
(one overall Grand Champion prize will be awarded)
- 4) Due care over all entries will be exercised. Committee is not responsible for loss or damage.
- 5) Horticultural exhibits must be listed under grower's name.
- 6) Accessories will be permitted whenever they help interpret the intended theme.
- 7) Exhibitor may make one entry in each horticultural class.
- 8) Exhibit must include name of variety.
- 9) Bottles will be furnished for horticultural specimens.
- 10) Potted and hanging plants must be in the exhibitor's possession for at least two months.

Tip for Exhibitors:

- 1) Disqualification results if more or less stems or blooms than allowed by schedule.
- 2) Specimens must be clean and have attractive amount of foliage attached.
- 3) Remove all foliage below water line.
- 4) Garden flowers: Using sharp knife, cut flowers the evening before or early morning the day of the show. Place in deep, warm water and store in cool place. Flowers and foliage for arrangements should be hardened overnight before arranging.
- 5) Cut all specimen stems long enough to present a good appearance in the bottle. Points are usually taken off for specimens with too short stems.
